STATE HOUSE

It becomes more apparent every day that it will be difficult, if not impossible for Governor Olcott to line up a sufficient majority of the Oregon legislators unqualifiedly in favor of a ratification session of the legislature to warrant him in calling it together. Thus far not more than 25 per cent of those who have been heard from are willing to conform entirely to the governor's stipulations—to serve without pay and to confine the action to the ratification of the suffrage amendment. The individual letters received from the Multnomah delegation have been supplemented by a petition signed by 19 members from that county, but while this petition waives per diem and mileage it does not pledge the signers to act only upon the suffrage amendment. Hence it does not carry the weight that it otherwise would.

Along with the Multnomah petition came resolutions from the Portland Labor Council and from the association of street railway employees. A communication was also received from Representative A. A. Smith, of Baker, stating that he is opposed to the special session on the ground that a real emergency does not exist. However, if it is called, he holds that it should be open to other needed legislation. Representative W. V. Fuller of Polk writes that he will join in the session if a majority of the members are lined up. Senator Orin of Multnomah sends in a second request for the session, but ignores the pledge to confine the action to ratification.

What the assembly would do to the state of Oregon if turned loose in the state house without complete restraint is indicated by the fact that some forehanded members are already at work upon drafts of bills that are considered urgent. Among other things contemplated is an amendment to the law creating the court of domestic relations; also to the irrigation and drainage statute; the Bean Barrett bill; legislation dealing with the telephone tolls; legislation with regard to the high cost of living; fish and game legislation, and a tinkering of the oleomargarine law. Certain to appear, also, would be the personal effort to move the state capital, and there is no calculating the lengths to which the body might go if the majority saw fit to remain in Salem for a week or more.

Governor Olcott today appointed F. A. Olmsted of Portland as a member of the Oregon Bureau of mines and geology to succeed H. N. Lawrie, who recently resigned.

For many years Mr. Olmsted was chemical engineer for the Crown Willamette Paper company and for the past four or five years has been consulting chemical and industrial engineer in Portland. It is believed that Mr. Olmsted's appointment will give a balance to the commission by having a chemical engineer as a member on the board, it being pointed out by those interested that chemical engineering deals largely with natural products and resources of the state which come within the field of mining.
