NEW BOOKS AT THE CITY LIBRARY.

"Greater Italy," the Italy of today, an intensely fascinating and peculiarly lucid study of European history and the later workings of international politics during the past sixty years by William Kay Wallace.

"Bolshevism," what it is and what it has done by John Spargo.

"The A B C of exhibit planning," a book dealing with the first questions which arise when graphic educational work is to be planned, by Evert G. Routzahn.

The International Auto Race held at Sheepshead Bay, June 14th, has caused much comment in the automobile world. The marvelous feat performed by Ralph De Palma has naturally called for criticism of machines.

De Palma won the 50 mile race in a Packard Racing Car, breaking the world's record. He averaged 113 miles an hour throughout the greater part of the race.

To the spectators the excitement was intense, the first 25 miles of the race were remarkable. Twelve times around the 2 mile track four six-cylinder racing cars swept along the track-neck speed, almost wheel to wheel, sixty thousand persons were held breathless, for it looked as though any moment the cars would crash together.

In the thirteenth lap De Palma shot right ahead of his competitors and gradually increased his lead. His car at this time reached a speed of 140 miles an hour.

Secretary Klein, of the state highway commission, has sent notices to the various county judges of the state informing them of the arrival of army trucks in Salem from the east and that one truck will be allotted to each county at present, though it is expected that later there will be enough assigned to Oregon by the war department to furnish two to each county. At present a large number will be requisitioned by the highway department for use in road work. The vehicles are of two-ton capacity, with steel frames and are adapted for heavy use. All of them saw more or less service during the war but are in good running order. The only expense to be borne by the counties is the freight charge from the east to Salem, which amounts to about \$225.
