trict attorney, it was learned today. As soon as the hoarders are discovered the investigators will be ordered to start work in another city, it was said here today at the federal trade commission office.

Texas Joins Drive.

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 15.—Charges of "extortionate profits" by Dallas retail merchants were made by P. H. Spencer, chief of the bureau of investigation of the department of justice and W. B. Burrell, assistant United States district attorney here today.

Gross profits of two retail shoe merchants ran 129 per cent, Spencer said, while other shoe merchants' profits averaged 70 per cent. Profits on some articles sold by women's apparel stores were more than 1000 per cent, the statement declared, adding names of the merchants would be made public as soon as authorized by Attorney General Palmer.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 15.—Eighteen million eggs, alleged to be held in storage here will be seized today by the United States marshal, District Attorney Hansley's office announced today. Officials refused to give out information as to who owns the supply.

ney's attack. He was more cautious, he succeeded in warding off many blows which he had feared.

Few people, it was said, have more than a general idea of what the trial cost.
