The streets committee, said no more paving could be done on account of the scarcity of labor. But Schunke said a block or two on North Church street should be paved as the petition had been presented to the council two years ago. Commissioner Lew will be instructed to pave at least this short strip this fall and it is up to him to find the laborers. Street laborers were allowed \$10 more a month.

Aug. Kerberger and five others petitioned for some graveling on Norway street between Summer and Capitol. They will pay for the gravel if the city will do the work. The petition was referred to the streets committee.

An ordinance providing for entering into a contract with the Portland Railway Light and Power company for lighting the city of Salem was read the first and second time. The contract is the usual five year one, beginning June 1, 1920. The high cost of living does not enter into this contract as the company offers the city its lights at the figures which have prevailed the past five years.

STATE HOUSE.

A recent wire from Senator Chas. L. McNary to Governor O'Leary sets at rest the rumor as to the withdrawal of the army airplanes from the forest patrol service. The telegram from Washington reads: "As the result of a conference with the Director of the Air Service, of the War Department, the commander of the Western Division at San Francisco will be notified by telegram that the eight planes now in use in forest fire patrol are to be retained. If any planes have been removed they will be returned."

In the effort to secure the mooring of the Pacific Fleet at Portland, Governor O'Leary has wired Admiral Rodman at Santa Barbara, Cal. "May I prevail upon you to make every effort to send as many of your fleet as possible directly to Portland after the presidential review without first going to Bremerton. Can I also urge upon you to have the ships stop at Astoria."

just made public a further statement in which he reviews the arguments of the woman suffrage leaders, and reiterates his former stipulations. He says in part: "In the first instance I have asked no member of the legislature to attend a special session of that body. On July 24, after being waited upon by a delegation of women, I did issue a statement to the effect that in evident the situation throughout the nation because such Oregon vote was needed to ratify the amendment. I would give the matter of convoking a special session serious consideration; that in event a majority of the members of the legislature voluntarily requested a special session and agreed to forego their mileage and per diem that I would call such a session."

"Further, I made it plain that I would expect no other legislation to be considered than the ratification of the suffrage amendment."

"I find that many of the legislators, perhaps a majority of those who have written to the executive office are opposed to a session confined to a ratification of the suffrage amendment."

"It was my firm belief that a great majority of the people of the state are in favor of a special session of the legislature which would throw the bars down to general legislation. Numerous suggestions for new and amendatory legislation have come into this office from legislators themselves. The people have scarcely familiarized themselves with the legislation of the 1919 session and there is no general demand for new laws. Unless a majority of the members of each house agree that they will pass upon nothing but the ratification of the suffrage amendment together with the other stipulation named I shall maintain the attitude that a session at this time is ill-advised."

George P. Downing Returns From Overseas Service

George P. Downing, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Downing of Shaw, has arrived at Camp Lewis and will be mustered out there, so he writes his father. George Downing has been overseas almost two years with the Second engineers and was in the great Argonne drive with the famous Second division. He spent one Christmas day in France and another in Germany.

The Second engineers saw some real fighting, since out of 1940 men who went into the campaign, there were only 246 fit for duty on November 11 when the armistice was signed. The last hot work young Downing was engaged in was when his detachment threw a bridge across the river Meuse on the night of November 10th in the record time of seven minutes, enabling the Yankee soldiers to cross that last natural defensive line of the German on the eve of the ending of the world war.

For real war experience one should grapple with food problems. A. hostess houses in Paris and she has much sympathy for friends back in the states who are feeling sorry because she is "stuck in the dull and uninteresting restaurant of a women's hotel in Paris."

"I suppose that they would think I had a real job, worthy of my time and thought if I was feeding soldiers or circus employees from a portable stove in a hot tent, threshing hands or something like that," she says. It is the girl who is assigned to a strictly American office who is missing the glory of France and the war.

"The hostess house was opened late in January to entertain representative women from all over France who were guests of the Y. W. C. A. for the first meeting of the provisional council held in Paris. French courtesy, charm and appreciation were all they have been painted by their most ardent admirers at that time. There was the woman from Brittany who wrote home to her husband each night of the wonders of having two lumps of sugar for her coffee and real cake. There was a countess who wanted to stay where beds did not have to be heated by hot stones and water bottles.

"We have considered putting a sign on the restaurant door to the effect 'If you cannot talk French, please do not talk French to the waitresses.' A dining room for war workers needs an interpreter badly. Helene comes along deeply distressed and carrying two nicely fried eggs. Madame ordered them and now refuses them. Madame's order interpreted, was really for apricot pie. Next, the interpreter gets a frantic signal from a corner table where a polite lieutenant is trying to find out just how to order two boiled eggs. Marcel not being able to understand why anyone should want eggs with their coats on.

"The chef formerly pursued the young pastry cook with a long knife when the boy didn't obey. He stated that it was the custom of French chefs and that he would never strike the boy. On being told that it was not done in America and after all it was an American hotel he changed his ways. The pastry cook is drenched with cold water now when there is occasion for a display of power."

Godwin Fights I. W. W. And Gains Many Converts

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 19.—W. H. Godwin, better known as "Three-Finger Jack," is here from Seattle, where he helped break up the reds organization in the interest of the government.

He followed 487 organizers here and speaks in several factories each day. He is said to be fast smashing any held bolshevism may have here. Since his arrival he has obtained the membership books of more than 1400 men who have resigned from the I. W. W. after hearing him speak.

"Of the 487 agitators who have come to Los Angeles to make trouble for the city and the United States government, but 26 are Americans," says Godwin. "The remainder are Russians for the most part, with a sprinkling of Germans. I have the photographs of 30,000 of these men and am locating them all the time. Since my work to break up this organization began I have obtained the membership books of 29,000 misguided men."

"When I tell them what I know of bolshevism, they come on my side immediately, especially after I bare the fact that they are lending their aid to an organization which would enslave them absolutely."

"The I. W. W. to my mind is the most subtle and iniquitous effort ever made to turn the world over to rapine and murder and shake the hands of freedom."
