WILSON'S TOUR AGAIN FOREMOST IN TREATY DISCUSSION

PRESIDENT MAY MEET PERSHING ON REUTRN

Washington, Aug. 22.—(United Press.)—President Wilson may go to New York to greet General Pershing, who is expected to arrive from overseas about September 6 or 9, it was announced at the White House today.

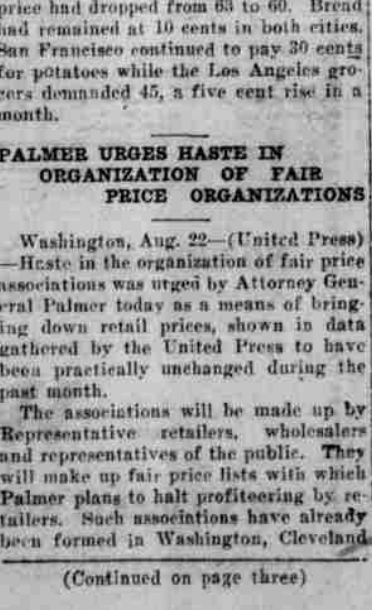
UNITED PRESS SURVEYS MARKETS OF BIG CITIES
