LATE HOP CONTRACTS BRING RECORD PRICE

Fifty And Fifty-Four Cents Are Paid Marion Growers By Portland Firm.

Fifty and fifty-four cents a pound is the figure named as the price for hops in contracts filed with the office of the county recorder by MeyersNeff, Broz. of Portland. The firm buys 15,000 pounds of this year's crop at 50 cents and 35,000 pounds at 54 cents.

Henry M. Weishaar and William McNeff, of St. Paul, contract with MeyersNeff, for the delivery of 11,000 pounds of this year's hops from a 20-acre tract four miles east of St. Paul, with delivery at Donald. The contract is dated July 22.

Andrew Weishaar and Anna Weishaar, of Marion, contract for the hops on their five acre tract three miles east of Donald for 59 cents a pound. They estimate their crop at 4,000 pounds.

For the high price of 54 cents a pound, 35,000 pounds of hops are contracted for by A. B. Connor, G. P. Connor and S. J. Connor, all of Marion. The 21-acre tract of hops is located on the mile west of St. Paul and the delivery is at Donald.

On a basis of an estimate of 11,000 pounds on their 20 acres and a price of 50 cents a pound, Weishaar and McNeff figure on returns of \$275.00 an acre. Andrew Weishaar and wife, on their five acre tract, with an estimate of 4,000 pounds, at 50 cents a pound have an average of \$400 per acre. The Connors, on their estimate of 35,000 pounds from 21 acres at 54 cents a pound, should receive a total of \$18,900 or an average of \$900.00 an acre.
