It was raining off and on during the entire month with a total precipitation of 4.51 inches, which is a heavy rainfall for September. Four years ago this month there was only .32 of an inch of rain while for 1916 there was 1.17 inches. In 1917 the September rain was 1.32 inches while just one year ago this month it was pretty dry with a total precipitation of .17 of an inch. Up to noon today, the rainfall in Salem for this month totals .41 of an inch.
