ANNUAL M. E. CHURCH CONFERENCE COMING

Prominent Churchmen On Program For Sessions Here October 1 To 6.

The program of the 67th annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church in Oregon has just been issued, covering six days rounded out with addresses, conferences, important business and social affairs, with plenty of music and good fellowship interspersed. The sessions proper begin October 1st and close October 6, but Monday and Tuesday, September 29-30 will be occupied with conference examinations and other matters, with a sacred concert under the direction of Prof. John R. Sites on Tuesday evening.

Outstanding features of the program will be the annual address of Bishop Matthew S. Hughes, D. D., L. L. D., president of the conference; and sermons and addresses by Clarence True Wilson, Justice Henry L. Benson of the supreme court, President Carl G. Doney of Willamette university, President H. J. Talbot of Kimball college, Charles A. Bowen, D. D., J. P. Marlatt, D. D., C. D. Day, D. D., E. E. Gilbert, D. D., Charles E. Bibson, D. D., S. J. Greenfield, D. D., John M. Walters, D. D., Joshua Stauffield, D. D.

The program will also include a series of missionary conferences in which prominent women workers will take part. Among social features will be the Seminary men's banquet at Leslie

church, and a reception to ministers' wives and lady delegates at the Kimball of the Luella Kimball club, and a luncheon given by the Ministers' Wives association at Leslie church.

Every effort is being made by the local churches to make this a memorable occasion, both to the visitors and the Salem public. Special attention will be given to the music of the conference, which will be furnished by the Kimball college chorus, under the direction of Rev. H. N. Aldrich.

Baby Carriage Pillow Pattern

In Outline, Satin & Eyelet Stitch



TO TRANSFER THIS DESIGN.
Put some soap in a pint of hot water, stir and remove soap. Saturate Design with mixture, then remove excess moisture by partially drying Design. Place material on a hard flat surface and lay the Design, face down, upon the material. Cover with two folds of newspaper, and with a table-spoon rub, pressing hard, until the Design is entirely transferred.

1. Allow for baby's carriage should be sheer material, embroidered in white to cover art ticking of delicate blue. The embroidery is done in white; but being placed over a delicate tint, the design is noticeable. No other color should be used and it ought to be of the best satin—delicate looking, filled with down and not feathers. Down is more expensive than feathers, and much lighter and softer for the tiny pillow.
2. Work the flowers and in satin stitch. Outline the stems and work the leaves with satin stitch. Outline the butterflies and cover the dots on wings with satin stitch, but not in raised effect. There are oblong eyelets for tiny ribbons and small ornamental circles to be made in usual eyelet stitch. Make an opening at each end, and place it a little to one side and not in the center of the pillow case.
3. If you do not care for the ribbon effect, then make the pillow case without eyelets, but have it a little longer than this size and open but one end of the case. But have it neatly finished. Do not use lace on this design. I really know of nothing more acceptable to a mother than a pair of handsomely made baby pillow covers. The two will cost in material about fifty cents. It depends on the fabric used. I would suggest good material for it has to be laundered so often. Sincerely yours, *Hilma North*
