Dominion Government Pool at Cave and Basin
 Pool at the Banff Springs Hotel
 The average man's idea of a vacation in the mountains does not include the pleasure of aquatic sports, but Banff, Alberta, in the heart of the Canadian Rockies, offers swimming in addition to the ordinary pleasures of the mountains.
 Sulphur Mountain rises three and half thousand feet above the picturesque valley in which Banff lies, which, in turn, is about five thousand feet above sea level. This mountain, like a giant tea kettle, is constantly heating vast quantities of water in its depths and impregnating it with sulphur and other minerals beneficial to man. Consequently, too, it expels the heated sulphur water and part of the flow is caught in the Cave and Basin, a wonderful swimming pool, built by the Canadian government at a cost of \$150,000. Through the summer months visitors from all over Canada and the United States bathe in this pool, which is 150 feet long by 35 feet wide and from 2 1/2 to 9 1/2 feet deep. The pool is fed from the springs in a nearby cave. This spring has a flow of 25,000 gallons an hour at a temperature of about 100 degrees Fahrenheit.
 The Dominion government of Canada maintains another pool on the wooded slopes of Sulphur Mountain, into which the water pours at about the same temperature. The Banff Springs Hotel likewise has a sulphur pool, and, in addition, a fresh water pool.
