Charging her husband, Henry M. Boedighermer, who is employed in an auto repair shop on Liberty street, with cruel and inhuman treatment and non-support, Mrs. Esther Boedighermer has started suit for divorce.

In her complaint, filed Friday, she says that several days after their marriage at Vancouver, April 23, 1918, her husband waxed cruel and inhuman in his treatment of her, and that during the time they resided in Portland, after the marriage he became jealous of her. She claims that he persistently accused her of meeting other men in his absence and accepting money from them.

War came, the complaint says, and her husband enlisted, but upon his return he continued to make false accusations of her, and refused to support her.

Mrs. Boedighermer says that an attempt made by her husband in May, 1919, to get a divorce, failed because of his inability to substantiate charges made against her.

The plaintiff asks the resumption of her maiden name, Esther Swartz, costs of the suit, and a permanent alimony.

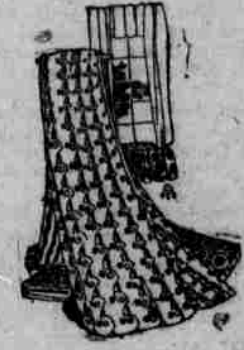
