

IMPROVEMENTS IN NORTH SALM TO BE DISCUSSED

Saying that the leaders of the North Salm Improvement association are opposed to "mere hot air, claptrap, exaggerated real estate boosting and boasting," a meeting to discuss 14 improvement enterprises in North Salm has been called for next Friday by President E. S. Tillingshaast and Secretary Ward K. Richardson. The meeting will be held in the Highland school auditorium.

Officials of the organization have sent letters, in which are outlined the proposed activities of the association, to all residents of North Salm. In them are set forth the following proposed improvements:

"Pavement to connect county and city pavements on Pacific highway.
Extend Capital street pavement to fair grounds roads.
"Connect county and city pavements on Front street.
"Pave Fourth street 20 feet.
"Pave Highland avenue.
"Pave Hazel street 20 feet. Locust to Highland.
"Open grade and gravel Hickory street to connect River road and Pacific highway.
"Pave Hickory street 20 feet wide.
"Open Cherry avenue through to Winter street.
"Solve the problem of disposing of surface flood water from the fair grounds and east.
"See that all sidewalks in North Salm are in creditable condition.
"More fire hydrants in North Salm.
"Mail service on all streets in North Salm.
"Water and sewer service where needed."

LOCAL BOY WHO JOINED CANADIAN ARMY BACK

The "Kid" of the Canadian army, and hero of many sanguinary battles with the foe, W. F. McAdoo, 18, who ran away from his home several years ago to join the Canadian army, has returned on furlough. When the war broke out, young McAdoo, who was at the time only 15 years old, applied for induction into Uncle Sam's army. He was rejected because of his age, but determined to go to war, he ran away to Canada. He succeeded in raising his age, due to his elderly appearance, and was accepted for service with the Canadians. He has been wounded several times. He will be discharged shortly, he believes.

Monday he left with his mother for Bend, Or., where they will join Mr. McAdoo, a printer of that city. Mr. McAdoo, before leaving for Bend was connected with the Statesman and was secretary of the local typographical union.

LABOR SHORTAGE IS BAN TO SCHOOLS IN COUNTRY; BOYS WORK

The shortage of labor in the country districts is preventing the resumption of the district schools on so large a scale as in former years, with the possibility that school will not be under full way for several weeks. This statement was made by School Supervisor Mary L. Fulkerson, who has returned from a survey of her schools in the northern part of the county.

In many places, she said, only the smallest attendance is noted. Boys from 10 to 18 are working on the farms to take the place of men, who cannot be obtained.

The shortage of books is also being felt in the country schools, Supervisor Fulkerson said.

An effort is being made by the supervisors to have all the school houses thoroughly cleaned as a means of preventing the spread of influenza should the epidemic recur. Many of the schools were cleaned before the classes began, Supervisor Fulkerson says. But she found several in unclean conditions.

The best school for cleanliness and the one which underwent the most repair during the vacation, Supervisor Fulkerson said, was Brush Creek. There, she says, a new furnace has been installed, platform in the front of the room has been removed, weeds in the yard have been removed, and the grass is neatly mown.

SOUTHERN OREGON OBSERVES
"HOME PRODUCTS" WEEK NOW

Medford, Or., Oct. 13.—(United Press)—Today is the beginning of "Home Products Week" in southern Oregon cities. Merchants of Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and Roseburg are displaying Oregon products in their establishments.

The business executives of Portland will visit the southern Oregon cities during the week, having organized a trade excursion.

Of 4000 schools in the state of Oregon, 150 have been unable to open this fall on account of lack of teachers, in spite of an increase of approximately 30 per cent in salaries.

FARM ADVERTISING COURSE IS PLANNED

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 13.—A short course on using the home newspaper to sell surplus farm produce will be offered farmers attending farmers week at the college December 29 to January 3, by C. J. McIntosh, farmer, farm writer and newspaper man.

"I have known farmers to pay a local commission man \$50 to sell 100 tons of alfalfa at \$20 a ton, when they could have sold it by paying the editor a dollar," said Mr. McIntosh in announcing the course. "They could then have kept the extra \$49, credited it to the buyer or split it with him. I asked why not advertise and sell direct, and they said, 'Why, I never thought of it.'"

"Not only the advantage but the method of using the home paper will be considered. The success of the advertisement depends on the facts selected for announcement, the form in which they are stated, and the reputation of the advertiser. All of these—except the last—will be explained and so far as possible demonstrated."

Specimen advertisements that have been business getters with results are wanted for this course.

One Killed, 18 Injured When Auto And Car Crash

Washington, Oct. 13.—One man was killed and eighteen injured when a speeding street car collided with an army motor truck in front of Walter Reed hospital here today. The man killed was Edward Souther, a private in the medical department of the hospital who was driving the truck.

For killing a female deer, Clair Fetzinger of Mill City was fined \$25.

HIGH SCHOOLS WILL GET MONEY ON BASIS OF REGISTRATIONS

High schools in which there are less than ten students enrolled will receive payment from the high school fund only in proportion to the number actually enrolled, according to an interpretation of the law prepared by I. H. Van Winkle, assistant attorney general, for the guidance of Superintendent of Instruction J. A. Churchill.

The law as enacted by the last legislature provides that "the county school superintendent shall apportion to each high school in his county a sum that will equal the total cost of educating the first ten pupils."

This does not mean pupils who are not in the high schools, the opinion states. "Therefore," the opinion continues, "its only effect is to make the payment applicable to the cost of educating high school pupils attending such high schools without reference to their place of residence but does not provide for payment for any number of such students or pupils not attending such high schools."

As an aid in the preparation of estimates to be submitted to the county courts of the amount required to be levied under this act in December, Superintendent Churchill today mailed to each county superintendent in the state the following letter explaining the provisions of the act:

(a) Give to each standard four-year high school in your county whatever it costs to educate ten pupils in that high school; provided if a high school does not have ten pupils in average daily attendance then give it an amount equal to the cost of educating the number it has.

(b) Subtract the amount distributed under (a) from the total cost of maintaining a high school for the year; divide this remainder by the average number of high school pupils belonging to the year; the quotient is the tuition cost; multiply the tuition cost by the average number of non-resident pupils belonging in the school; this product, together with the amount received for the first ten pupils, or part thereof, will give the total amount to be paid the school from the high school fund.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 13.—Plans are being made to make the annual homecoming to be held on the week end of November 15, the largest event of its kind ever held at the university. Alumni and former students from all over the state and nation are urged to come, and it is expected the week end this year will bring many former students who could not attend last year because of the war conditions.
