

OREGON'S SHARE OF FOREST RECEIPTS IS RECEIVED HERE

A United States treasury warrant for \$115,406.74 was received by the secretary of state's office, Thursday, from the federal department of agriculture, this sum representing 25 per cent of all moneys received from forest reserves within the state during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918. This money is to be apportioned among the various counties in the state containing forest reserve lands and will be expended for public school and road purposes.

The receipts are divided among the seventeen forest reserves in the state as follows:

This remittance which represents money received from rentals and timber sales is approximately \$20,000 greater than the remittance received from the department of agriculture last year.

LLOYD-GEORGE ASK SUPPORT FOR TURKEY

Sheffield, Eng., Oct. 18.—(United Press.)—Premier Lloyd-George, in an address here today urged the United States to accept a mandate for parts of Turkey.

"They are appealing to America for help," the premier said, "and I hope not in vain. Unless America listens, I do not know what will happen to parts of the Turkish empire."

Lloyd-George added that it would sound impertinent to urge the United States to accept a Turkish mandate, "were it not for the fact that we are undertaking similar responsibilities and find we are coming to the limit of our strength."

The premier declared the delay in the Turkish treaty could be attributed to the fact that Turkey's destiny could not be settled until it was learned whether the United States would share the burdens of civilization outside of America.

"We are undertaking a great civilizing duty at a great cost," he said. "We beg America to join us."
